CAMPUS GUIDE TO RECYCLING & WASTE DISPOSAL



Denison University Office of Sustainability Update: August 2022 Denison is committed to reducing its impact on the environment. To that end, Denison operates an extensive campus recycling program to reduce the amount of waste sent to landfills and to utilize resources in a more responsible manner. We recognize, however, that recycling is only one part of the issue. To move toward a more sustainable campus, Denison also must strive to reduce its consumption and waste in all aspects of campus operations.

Recycling is good – but there are other important steps we can take. Practicing the Five R's – reduce, reuse, recycle, rot and respect – is one of the easiest and most cost-effective ways to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and lessen our ecological footprint.

PRACTICING THE 5Rs



Reduce - Reduce your waste and your "ecological footprint;" bring your own bags when you shop; buy items with less packaging, only buy what you need.



Reuse - Reuse products instead of throwing them away; donate items to thrift or charity stores; find "new" items on Craigslist.org and Freecycle.org or at neighborhood garage sales.



Recycle - Choose to recycle everything that is recyclable; don't throw something in the trash without checking first to see if it is recyclable or reusable.



Rot (Compost) – By composting food scraps and yard waste you reduce waste and create valuable nutrients that can be put back into the soil.

RESPECT



Respect - Respecting the environment means making conscious decisions about reducing, recycling, and reusing.

This guide offers resources and information on recycling and proper waste disposal. Each member of the Denison Community is responsible for doing his or her part.

Quick Reference Guide What can be recycled in a campus recycling bin?

RECYCLE THESE:

Combine recyclables into a campus recycling container. No need separate items unless specifically labeled.

PLASTICS Bottles, jugs, tubs and cups



Reattach lid. Yogurt and fruit cups OK.

PAPER



Boxes should be broken down.

METAL CANS & CUPS



Non-hazardous & non-flammable items only.



CARTONS



Remove caps & straws.

Please keep these items out of the recycling bins. They can be dangerous to our staff, damage equipment and disrupt our campus recycling process.
