Requirements for an Economics Major

Effective with students entering Fall 2015, all economics majors must complete a minimum of ten courses. The major must satisfy the following requirements:

• Core Courses (6 courses, 24 credit hours)

In addition to the above six Core requirements, all students must take at least four additional courses, only one of which can be a 200-level course. **Beginning with students entering Fall 2013, at least one of these elective courses must satisfy the department's writing requirement.** Each semester some courses will be designated Writing Courses.
